

FUND OBJECTIVE

FUND MANAGER

The objective of the Flagship IP Balanced Fund is to seek steady growth of both capital and income through investments in a broad range of asset classes in a balanced manner. This Regulation 28 managed fund is classified as South African - Multi Asset - High Equity and aims to maximize returns over the medium to long term utilising flexible asset allocation strategies taking active decisions in accordance with current and projected economic and market conditions. The fund invests in equities, bonds, property and money market and is restricted to maximum limits in accordance with prudential regulations which, inter alia, provide that equity, held both locally and abroad, will not exceed 75% of the fund and offshore investment is restricted to 30% of the fund. Out-performance is targeted through aggressive asset allocation and focused stock selection based on in-house proprietary models and extensive internal and external research. The portfolio uses financial instruments only to the extent permitted by legislation.



FUND COMMENTARY ~ NOVEMBER 2020

The fund's +2.7% return was significantly below the staggering +10.5% performance of the JSE Allshare and the sector benchmark of 6.7%. The JSE's unloved and more cyclical counters rallied hard, with 2020's downtrodden sectors finding some serious favour - for the month of November the Property sector was up 17.5%, Consumer Goods +21.9%, and Financials +17.1%. The fund had very little exposure to these sectors but did hold over 10% in gold and gold shares, which were hammered (Gold Fields -23.8%, Harmony -20.7% and Anglogold -11.5%). We did reposition the fund, to an extent, early in the month and now hold some SA financial and consumer sector exposure, at the expense of media and gold.

As required by legislation, we confirm that the fund has adhered to its policy objective and strategy.

MARKET COMMENTARY

International

November saw Biden triumph in the US election, notwithstanding that Trump remains reluctant to concede Biden's victory. Should the Democrats win the two Georgian Senate seats which are up for re-election in January, they will be in control of both the Congress and the Senate – *and* have their candidate installed as president.

It was also revealed that <u>three</u> Covid vaccines were shown to be effective in preliminary trials. The Astrazeneca vaccine demonstrates particular promise because it can be stored more easily and it will be made available at a lower price point. This caused markets to rally, despite the fact that the threat of further lockdowns looms ominously over Western Europe.

The S&P 500 rose 12.4% in dollars during the month, although the strong appreciation of the ZAR took some of the shine off rand-priced assets. The S&P 500 is now up almost 14% year-to-date, while the Nasdaq, with its higher tech weighting, is up a massive 37%. Who would have anticipated these year-to-date moves back in March '20?

In sympathy with the widespread risk-on appetite, Brent rose 27% during the month, while gold, which is a safe-haven asset, weakened by 5.4%.

Brexit negotiations create continued uncertainty with neither party prepared to give an inch on the "level playing field" as well as fishing rights within British waters. This uncertainty has seen the pound underperform other developed world currencies year-to-date. Most analysts, however, continue to expect a last-minute deal to be announced before the revised 31 December deadline.

South Africa

South Africa was a beneficiary of the pervading risk-on appetite – even multiple credit-rating downgrades could not temper the prevailing positive sentiment. This was no doubt aided by the fact that an arrest warrant was issued for Ace Magashule. This is hopefully a good indication that justice will prevail for those implicated in corruption and state capture.

A further positive spin-off of the Ace Magashule saga is that it may weaken the Zuma faction within the ANC and give Cyril Ramaphosa sufficient political capital to implement much needed reforms.

The JSE's staggering 10.5% rally during the month resulted in the local market breaking even for the year to date. The rand also rallied by 4.8%, although it remains 10.5% lower since the start of the year.

Investment Policy

The Flagship IP Balanced Fund is to be a domestic, asset-allocation, prudential variable portfolio. The primary objective of the fund is to seek steady but stable growth of both capital and income through investments in a broad range of asset classes in a balanced manner. In order to achieve its objective, the investments normally to be included will comprise a combination of securities in the equity, bond, property and money markets. The portfolio will have an equity exposure (including international equity) between 0% and 75% at all times. Investments to be included in the Flagship IP Balanced Fund will comprise a combination of securities and assets in liquid form which are considered consistent with the portfolio's primary objective and that the Act or the Registrar may from time allow, all to be acquired at fair market value. The portfolio may also include participatory interests or any other form of participation in portfolio of collective investment schemes registered in South Africa or operated in territories with a regulatory environment which is to the satisfaction of the Manager and the Trustee and as legislation permits. Nothing contained in the investment policy shall preclude the manager from varying the ratio of the aforementioned securities relative to each other (except as required by the Act), or the assets themselves, to maximise capital growth and investment potential, should changing economic factors or market conditions so demand. Provided also that nothing contained in the investment policy shall preclude the Manager from retaining cash in the portfolio and / or placing cash on deposit in terms of the deed. Provided further that the Manager shall ensure that the portfolio includes securities and assets in liquid form, of at least the aggregate value required, from time to time, by the Act. The Manager will be permitted to invest on behalf of the portfolio in financial instruments as legislation permits. TER and Transaction Costs

From 1 October 2017 to 30 September 2020 2.43% of the value of the fund was incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the fund. 0.31% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the fund. Therefore, 2.74% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the investment of the fund. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return.
