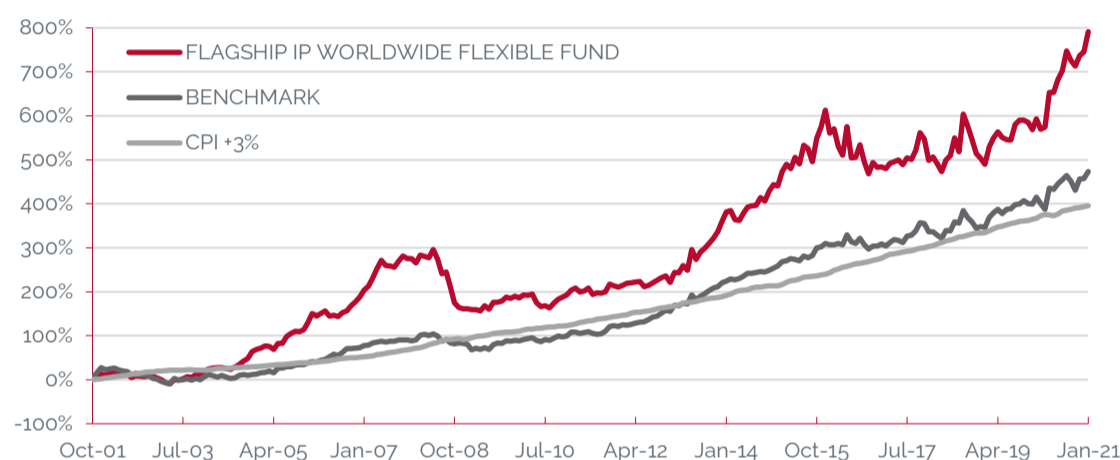

FUND OBJECTIVE

To provide long term capital growth from an actively managed portfolio comprising equities, bonds, listed property and cash – both local and foreign. To achieve long term capital growth, the fund will have a bias towards equity (which typically offers the best returns over the long run), but no guidelines have been set for maximum and minimum exposures to any one asset class. Our benchmark is 60% equities, 20% bonds and 20% cash with each category split equally between local and international assets. The fund is classified with ASISA as a Worldwide - Multi Asset - Flexible fund.

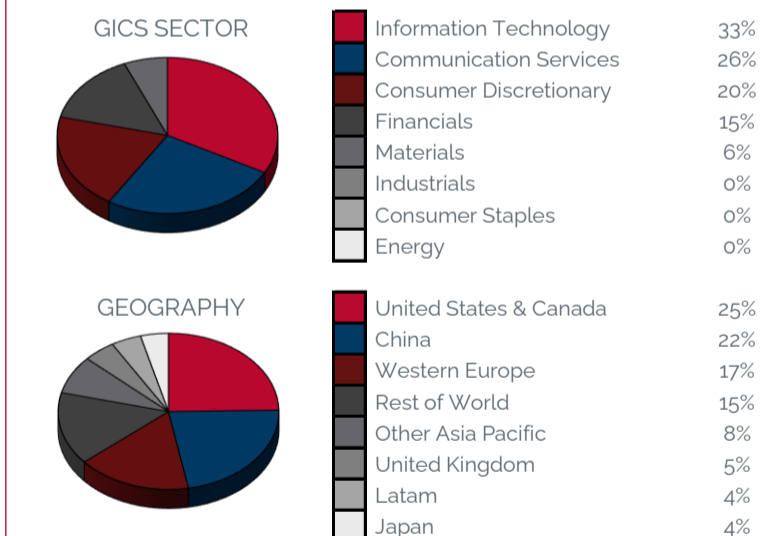

FUND COMMENTARY - JANUARY 2021

Your fund returned +5.4% for the month. Over the past year the fund returned +28.6% after all fees, versus its benchmark of +11.3%. The largest contributors to performance in the last month were TCS Group (+25.4%), Netease (+20.1%) and Tencent (+27.6%). The largest detractors were Global Payments (-18.1%), PagSeguro (-14%) and Xero (-10.5%). Duck Creek Technologies, a provider of insurance software, was added in the month of January. Ferguson and Booking.com were exited.

As required by legislation, we confirm that the fund has adhered to its policy objective and strategy.

MARKET COMMENTARY

International

The MSCI All Country World Index returned 0.1% for the month in USD and 3.4% in ZAR. Emerging Markets stocks and the Nasdaq both outperformed this, returning 5.0% and 1.7% in USD respectively. The oil price climbed 9.4% for the month (now at \$56 per barrel), up 48% over the past three months.

The first deliveries of vaccines and the trading fiasco at GameStop dominated January headlines. Smaller nations like Israel, Bahrain and the UAE have predictably done better in delivering vaccines, while the rollout in the UK and Europe has been problematic. We note that U.S. vaccination progress is leading to rapidly falling new cases and hospitalization data. This will continue, and we celebrate both the efforts of medical teams around the world to immunize the vulnerable, as well as a significantly improving economic outlook for the second half of the year.

Of most interest were the GameStop headlines. The trading frenzy in GameStop shares over the past week has not only provided grand theatre, but also a pertinent lesson in market price formation and risk management. Already, the results of the GameStop short squeeze have raised questions about market efficiency, regulation and financial stability, and it is clear that, notwithstanding Trump having left office with a blocked Twitter account, social media has not lost its influence on markets.

South Africa

South African equities returned 5.5% in ZAR in January. While local equities got off to a strong start, the SA index has underperformed emerging market peers by 19% over the past 12 months, to say nothing of developed market peers. It has become clear that the risks facing South Africa are now well understood by market participants, with the MSCI SA multiple (10.9x) now at a 32% discount to emerging markets.

Despite the government's best efforts to foil it, the economy continues to try and resuscitate itself. Unsurprisingly, the President's plan of fighting the pandemic, corruption and a financial disaster with words and posturing have not borne fruit, and have instead exposed how hollowed out the capabilities of the state have become. In the words of Exxaro's frustrated CEO: "*what is now needed urgently is decisive action from the president. Words and vague intentions simply do not cut it*". The President will appear appropriately shocked.

Elsewhere, a much-needed prosecution of former president Jacob Zuma continues to be gobsmackingly out of reach, with the organs of State unable to act on his clear disregard for the law of the land. Should he not be prosecuted, it would send a clear signal that South Africa has "*neither a political nor economic environment for investment in the country*", according to Business Unity SA president Siphon Pityana. We agree.

Unless we receive information from you indicating otherwise, we will be obliged to withhold the default DWT of 20%.

Investment Policy

The Flagship IP Worldwide Flexible Fund is a Worldwide-Asset Allocation portfolio in the Flexible Portfolio Sector which invests at least 15% of its assets in South African investment markets and no more than 85% of its assets in approved foreign investment markets, at all times, with specific focus on asset allocation. The primary objective of the Flagship IP Worldwide Flexible Fund is to offer medium to long-term capital growth. The portfolio will invest in a flexible combination of investments in equity, bond, money or property markets to maximise total returns over the long term. The portfolio will be actively managed with exposure to various asset classes being varied to reflect changing economic and market circumstances, in order to maximise returns for investors.

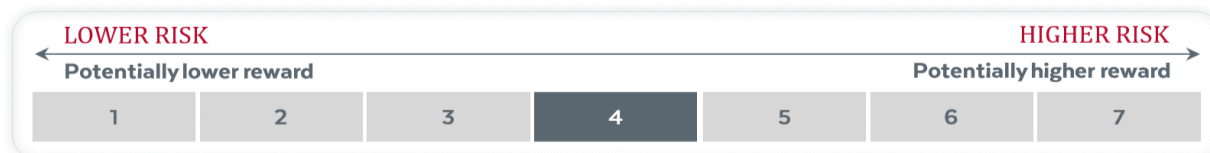
In order to achieve its objective, the investments normally included in the Flagship IP Worldwide Flexible Fund will comprise a combination of local and foreign securities, exchange securities, stock including loan stock, financially sound listed property investments and participatory interests in portfolios of collective investment schemes in property shares, assets in liquid form and any other securities which are considered consistent with the portfolio's primary objective and the Act or the Registrar may from time to time allow, all to be acquired at fair market value. To the extent permitted by legislation, the fund may use exchange traded funds and financial instruments to implement specific investment views.

TER and Transaction Costs

From 1 October 2017 to 30 September 2020 2.21% of the value of the fund was incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the fund. 0.61% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the fund. Therefore, 2.82% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the investment of the fund. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER may not necessarily be an accurate indication of future TER's. Transaction Costs are a necessary cost in administering the fund and impacts fund returns. It should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of fund, the investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER.
