


FUND OBJECTIVE

The Flagship IP Flexible Value Fund aims to outperform both the JSE All Share Index and competing funds over the medium to long term. We rely on fundamental research to identify investments which are trading at a discount to their intrinsic value and to determine which asset classes are the most attractive. The fund will typically have a very different equity profile from that of the All Share Index. Risk is reduced through the fund's value oriented approach.

FUND COMMENTARY - DECEMBER 2021

The fund's 55% return for 2021 was a very welcome outcome after the difficult prior two years. December saw just one change in the top ten holdings, with Naspers replacing African Rainbow Capital (ARC). We took advantage of a very strong rally in ARC to lighten our holding, and switched some of the proceeds into Naspers, which underperformed the ALSI by almost 35% in 2021. Of course, Naspers is a share which we should have held from 2008 until 2020 as it rose relentlessly. Finally, it took a sharp sell-off in Chinese tech stocks last year to stop the Naspers juggernaut in its tracks. This created an opportunity to gain exposure to Tencent at a greatly discounted price through Naspers in the second half of last year. We now hold three Top 40 stocks in the top ten - all nonmining rand hedges. For the rest, the fund's JSE exposure is dominated by small caps, where we still find excellent value, although no longer the absolute bargain prices that were on offer in 2020.

As required by legislation, we confirm that the fund has adhered to its policy objective and strategy.

MARKET COMMENTARY

International

2021 was a great year for risk assets. The MSCI ACWI was up 19% for the year and both oil and copper rallied, up 50% and 29% respectively. However, due to rising inflation expectations, bonds performed poorly and gold closed the year down 4%.

Some very interesting dynamics took place beneath the headline numbers. If one looks at US stocks, which account for the bulk of our benchmark, just five stocks (Apple, Microsoft, Nvidia, Tesla and Alphabet) accounted for more than 50% of the S&P 500 returns since April, while hundreds of companies were trading at their lowest levels over the last 12 months. EM stocks, which retreated by 2%, also continued to underperform developed world stocks by a wide margin.

Geopolitical tensions ratcheted higher over the Russian troop build-up near Ukraine while the emergence of the Omicron COVID-19 variant created significant volatility across most markets and asset classes earlier in the month. But equities were able to shake off fears of the fast-spreading, less virulent variant and December saw strong gains led by the US (MSCI World +4.0%, S&P +4.4%).

Investors increased their expectations of a Fed hike as the FOMC announced a faster tapering schedule; US 2-year yields rose 17bps to 0.73%. However, the dollar weakened with DXY down 0.3% and EM FX up 0.7%. Economic momentum slowed slightly with key Economic Surprise Indices down in December in Europe (hard hit by Omicron) and China but up in the US. In commodities, Brent crude rebounded 11% to close the year at US\$77.46, its highest year-end close since 2013.

South Africa

The JSE ALSI had an excellent 2021, rallying 29% in ZAR. As the rand weakened by 10% against the USD, this meant the JSE delivered a 19% return in US dollars for the year, marginally ahead of the MSCI ACWI. Notwithstanding this good 1-year performance, it continues to be a laggard over longer periods. An issue to be aware of in 2022, is whether Ramaphosa will be re-elected as president of the ANC in its national elective conference in December. This will determine whether or not he is eligible to run for president in 2024's national election.

Investment Policy

The Flagship IP Flexible Value Fund is an asset allocation portfolio. The manager, in selecting securities for the portfolio, will seek to follow an investment policy which will secure for investors an optimum overall return, that is to say the steady growth of income and the preservation of capital in real terms. In order to achieve these main objectives the investments to be acquired for the Flagship IP Flexible Value Fund, shall comprise a mix of securities, which may include ordinary shares, preference shares, debentures, fixed interest instruments, gilts and money market instruments as defined in the Act and the Deed, all to be acquired at a fair market value. The portfolio may also include participatory interests or any other form of participation in portfolios of collective investment schemes or other similar schemes. Where the aforementioned schemes are operated in territories other than in South Africa, participatory interests or any other form of participation in these schemes will be included in the portfolio only where the regulatory environment is to the satisfaction of the manager and trustee and is of sufficient standard to provide investor protection at least equivalent to that in South Africa. The portfolio is permitted to invest in financial instruments in line with the conditions by the Registrar from time to time.

TER and Transaction Costs

From 1 October 2018 to 30 September 2021, 1.70% of the value of the fund was incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the fund. 0.28% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the fund. Therefore 1.98% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the investment of the fund. Inclusive in the TER of 1.70%, a performance fee of 0% of the Net Asset Value of the class of Financial Product was recovered. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER may not necessarily be an accurate indication of future TER's. Transaction Costs are a necessary cost in administering the fund and impacts fund returns.
