


#### **FUND OBJECTIVE**

The objective of the Flagship IP Balanced Fund is to seek steady growth of both capital and income through investments in a broad range of asset classes in a balanced manner. This Regulation 28 managed fund is classified as South African - Multi Asset - High Equity and aims to maximize returns over the medium to long term utilising flexible asset allocation strategies taking active decisions in accordance with current and projected economic and market conditions. The fund invests in equities, bonds, property and money market and is restricted to maximum limits in accordance with prudential regulations which, inter alia, provide that equity, held both locally and abroad, will not exceed 75% of the fund and offshore investment is restricted to 30% of the fund. Out-performance is targeted through aggressive asset allocation and focused stock selection based on in-house proprietary models and extensive internal and external research. The portfolio uses financial instruments only to the extent permitted by legislation.



## FUND COMMENTARY - DECEMBER 2022

The Flagship IP Balanced Fund returned -0.5% in December, in line with the fund's sector average benchmark, in a month where most global equity indices lost ground as lower-than-expected inflation numbers failed to quell fears about a looming recession in 2023. The fund's performance for the year was disappointing, falling 6.7% against the benchmark's more moderate -1.1% return, almost primarily due to poor returns from the fund's offshore holdings. Locally, the substantial second half fight back from the tech sector (Naspers +76% from April lows), together with large 6 month moves in Resources (+15.0% for H2'22) and Property (+15.1% in H2'22) lifted both the fund and the JSE from their mid-year doldrums. As required by legislation, we confirm that the fund has adhered to its policy objective and strategy.

#### **MARKET COMMENTARY**

for equity markets since the financial crisis in 2008. The S&P 500 was down 5.7% for the month and down 18% for the year, in line with the performance of the MSCI ACWI, while the tech-heavy Nasdaq was down 8.6% during December and lost a third of its value during the year. Hong Kong's Hang Seng Index capped off a rollercoaster year with a strong month, returning 6.4%, and finishing the year 12.6% down (in USD). The UK-based FTSE 100 was a relative bright light, decreasing only 7% for the year in USD, despite the fallout from Brexit, extreme consumer pricing pressures, and farcical Tory leadership.

Consequently, the valuations assigned by the market have given up a lot of The JSE followed international trends and was down in December, dropping ground with the S&P declining from a peak of 21.4x to 16.7x one year forward 2.3%. However, the local market performed relatively well over the year, ending earnings expectations over the course of the year. The retracement in the up 4% (in ZAR). Offsetting this performance was the continued depreciation of Nasdaq was much more pronounced, dropping from 31.4x to 21.7x. Both the S&P and Nasdaq are now slightly below their average 10-year multiples of 17.3x and 22.4x respectively. High-flying tech giants were hit especially hard, as Meta tumbled 65% while Google parent Alphabet, Amazon, Apple and Microsoft all lost between 30 and 50% of their value.

The price of oil fluctuated wildly, closing 30% below its early-year high of \$130/barrel, and is now barely 10% higher than at the start of the year.

A weak December summarized the general trend in what was the worst year. The last month of the year saw China finally reverse course on most of its COVID restrictions. This included scrapping quarantine requirements for inbound visitors, downgrading the seriousness to a class B infectious disease, and ceasing to publish daily death and infection numbers.

This remains the status quo heading into 2023.

Andre de Ruyter's mid-month resignation created shockwaves through the local economy, and the uncertainty around the cash-strapped, debt-ridden parastatal will not instill investors and the business sector with confidence. Finally, despite the recent Phala Phala controversy, Cyril Ramaphosa was reelected as the ANC President, with Paul Mashatile assuming the position of Deputy President, and a Top 6 more aligned with the President.

### **Investment Policy**

The Flagship IP Balanced Fund is to be a domestic, asset-allocation, prudential variable portfolio. The primary objective of the fund is to seek steady but stable growth of both capital and income through investments in a broad range of asset classes in a balanced manner. In order to achieve its objective, the investments normally to be included will comprise a combination of securities in the equity, bond, property and money markets. The portfolio will have an equity exposure (including international equity) between 0% and 75% at all times. Investments to be included in the Flagship IP Balanced Fund will comprise a combination of securities and assets in liquid form which are considered consistent with the portfolio's primary objective and that the Act or the Registrar may from time to time allow, all to be acquired at fair market value. The portfolio may also include participatory interests or any other form of participation in portfolios of collective investment schemes registered in South Africa or operated in territories with a regulatory environment which is to the satisfaction of the Manager and the Trustee and as legislation permits. Nothing contained in the investment policy shall preclude the manager from varying the ratio of the aforementioned securities relative to each other (except as required by the Act), or the assets themselves, to maximise capital growth and investment potential, should changing economic factors or market conditions so demand. Provided also that nothing contained in the investment policy shall preclude the Manager from retaining cash in the portfolio and / or placing cash on deposit in terms of the deed. Provided further that the Manager shall ensure that the portfolio includes securities and assets in liquid form, of at least the aggregate value required, from time to time, by the Act. The Manager will be permitted to invest on behalf of the portfolio in offshore investments as legislation permits. The Manager will be permitted to invest on behalf of the portfolio in financial instruments as legislation permits. The portfolio will be managed so as to comply with prudential requirements with which a pension fund investment strategy must comply in terms of applicable legislation. For the purpose of this portfolio, the manager shall reserve the right to close the portfolio to new investors on a date determined by the manager. This will be done in order to be able to manage the fund in accordance with its mandate. The manager may, once a portfolio has been closed, open that portfolio again to new investors on a date determined by the manager

# **TER and Transaction Costs**

From 1 October 2019 to 30 September 2022 2.43% of the value of the fund was incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the fund. 0.30% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the fund. Therefore, 2.73% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the investment of the fund. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER may not necessarily be an accurate indication of future TER's. Transaction Costs are a necessary cost in administering the fund and impacts fund returns. It should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of fund, the investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER.
