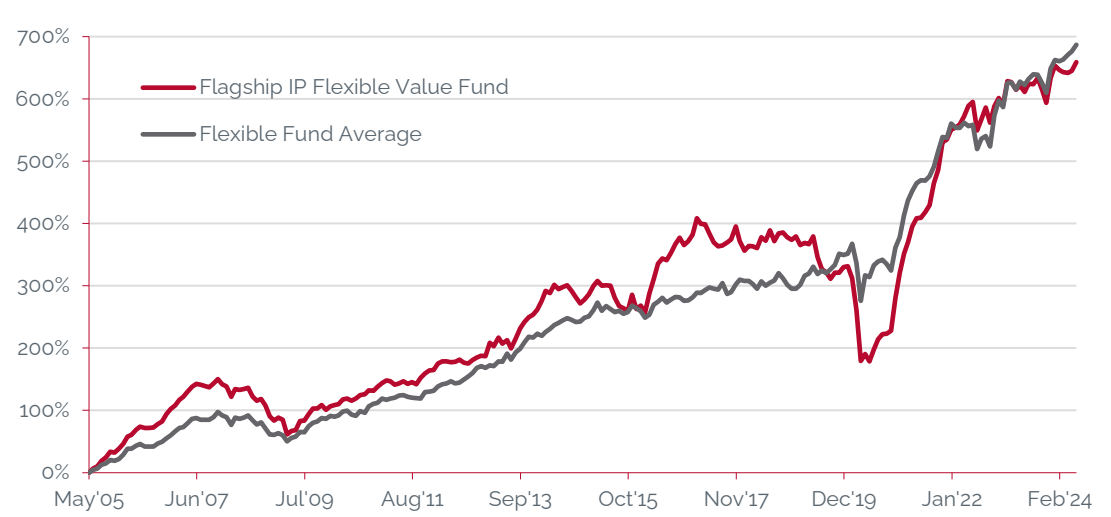

## FUND OBJECTIVE

The Flagship IP Flexible Value Fund aims to outperform both the JSE All Share Index and competing funds over the medium to long term. We rely on fundamental research to identify investments which are trading at a discount to their intrinsic value and to determine which asset classes are the most attractive. The fund will typically have a very different equity profile from that of the All Share Index. Risk is reduced through the fund's value oriented approach.

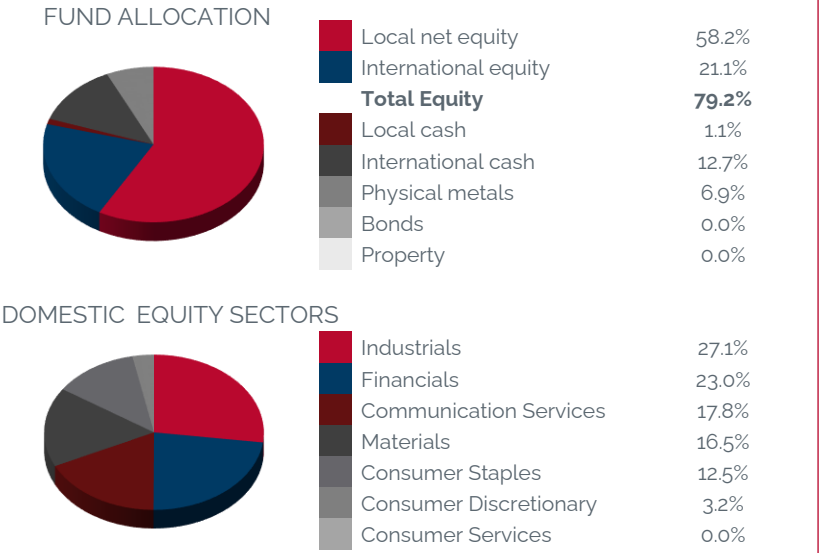

## FUND COMMENTARY - MAY 2024

The fund gained 1.9% in May and is now back, modestly, into positive territory for the year. During the month we reduced offshore equity exposure from 26% to 21%, but increased the domestic equity weighting from 54% to 58%. This reflects our view that domestic equities are, by any normal criteria, undervalued. Invicta was the fund's largest purchase and is now a top ten holding. We expect positive results from the company in late June and believe that the market will react favourably if earnings meet our expectations. We also increased exposure to selected investment holding companies such as Ethos Capital and HCI, where recent share price weakness has brought the shares back to an attractive entry level.

As required by legislation, we confirm that the fund has adhered to its policy objective and strategy.

MARKET COMMENTARY

After a brief respite in April, markets continued their impressive rally in May. In the US, the S&P 500 increased by 4.9%, while the Nasdaq gained nearly 7% as all-things tech continued to shine. In the UK, the FTSE gained 2.0%, while in the East, the Hang Seng also continued its recovery, increasing by 2.5%. The index has now gained nearly 11% over the last 3 months as the Chinese market reacted positively to the news that Beijing will actively support the stumbling property market.

On the commodity front, oil continued its fall as fears of a wider regional war in the Middle East continued to decline, and Brent Crude closed the month 7.1% lower. Silver, on the other hand, gained 15.6% in May, with natural gas increasing nearly 30%.

There was no shortage of major news items over the course of the month. On the geopolitical front, Israel continued its planned offensive on Rafah, despite warnings from its long-time allies. This led to deteriorating global sentiment for its war effort from the likes of Spain, Norway, and Ireland – all of whom moved to acknowledge a Palestinian State. In Ukraine, Russia made progress in a renewed press towards Kharkiv while Putin announced, in a shock move, the replacement of his defence minister who has overseen the Ukraine invasion thus far.

Lastly, the strained relations between Washington and Beijing were also on full display with the Biden administration hiking tariffs on Chinese-made electric vehicles from 25% to as much as 100%; Qualcomm and Intel having their export licenses to China revoked; Microsoft asking Chinese employees to consider relocating from mainland China; and the US government ruling that Chinese owned Tik Tok had to be sold or face a complete ban in the US.

Locally, the major news item was, of course, the South African general election where the ANC's grip on power was loosened as it lost its outright majority, with the party's share of the national vote declining a substantial 16%. This outcome was not particularly surprising – with ANC Secretary General, Fikile Mbalula, campaigning in one of Durban's poorest suburbs in a multi-million Rand Mercedes Benz G-Wagon – indicating the ruling party has clearly lost touch with the people.

The result led to a range of hopes and emotions in the markets. From a strengthening Rand and rallying market on hopes of an ANC and DA alliance, to all those gains reversing as the possibility of an ANC/EFF/PA alliance emerged. At the time of writing, the next phase remains unclear, markets remain on a knife's edge, and South Africa's future quite literally hangs in the balance.

Investment Policy

The Flagship IP Flexible Value Fund is an asset allocation portfolio. The manager, in selecting securities for the portfolio, will seek to follow an investment policy which will secure for investors an optimum overall return, that is to say the steady growth of income and the preservation of capital in real terms. In order to achieve these main objectives the investments to be acquired for the Flagship IP Flexible Value Fund, shall comprise a mix of securities, which may include ordinary shares, preference shares, debentures, fixed interest instruments, gilts and money market instruments as defined in the Act and the Deed, all to be acquired at a fair market value. The portfolio may also include participatory interests or any other form of participation in portfolios of collective investment schemes or other similar schemes. Where the aforementioned schemes are operated in territories other than in South Africa, participatory interests or any other form of participation in these schemes will be included in the portfolio only where the regulatory environment is to the satisfaction of the manager and trustee and is of sufficient standard to provide investor protection at least equivalent to that in South Africa. The portfolio is permitted to invest in financial instruments in line with the conditions by the Registrar from time to time.

TER and Transaction Costs

From 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2024, 1.80% of the value of the fund was incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the fund. 0.26% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the fund. Therefore 2.06% of the value of the fund was incurred as costs relating to the investment of the fund. Inclusive in the TER of 1.80%, a performance fee of 0% of the Net Asset Value of the class of Financial Product was recovered. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER may not necessarily be an accurate indication of future TER's. Transaction Costs are a necessary cost in administering the fund and impacts fund returns.
